## Florence County Emergency Operations Center Status:

Florence County EOC remains at OPCON 2 (Enhanced Awareness) and continues to monitor the COVID-19 situation. We continue to promote good handwashing and respiratory hygiene among our employees and the public.

### State of Emergency

#### The Emergency Support Functions key notes:

##### ESF-5:

- On Thursday, March 19, 2020, Florence County Council approved the attached Official Emergency Proclamation declaring a State of Emergency in Florence County.
- Effective noon on Thursday, March 19, 2020, Florence County will restrict access to all county facilities. See attached press release for details.

##### ESF-8:

- As of Wednesday, April 01, 2020, there are three (3) confirmed death from COVID-19 in Florence County, and twenty-one (21) confirmed positive cases of COVID-19.

Per DHEC, additionally projections for new cases of COVID-19 in the state through May 2 are also included in today's web update. This data projects 2,657 cumulative case by April 2 and 8,053 cases by May 2, however, projected data is estimated and may change significantly due to various factors.

As of Tuesday, March 24, 2020, Governor Henry McMaster and South Carolina Superintendent of Education Molly Spearman today released the following joint statement announcing that South Carolina's schools will remain closed for the duration of the month of April: "At this time, students, parents, and families should plan for South Carolina's schools to remain closed through the month of April. Our dedicated teachers and school administrators have done a tremendous job in making it possible for our students to learn at home. We understand that the prospect of schools remaining closed for an extended period of time places stress and strain on parents and children. Rest assured, if there is any way to safely open our schools earlier, we will do that, but schools must remain closed to protect the health and safety of South Carolinians."

- The Governor declared a public health threat posed by COVID-19 in Executive Order 2020-08 dated March 13, 2020 and ordered all public schools, college and university's closed through March 31, 2020.
- On Wednesday, April 01, 2020, DHEC reports 1,293 cases and 26 deaths in South Carolina. Contact investigations show there is a possibility for community spread.

**Beginning Wednesday, April 1, 2020, nonessential businesses throughout the state are required to close in order to combat the spread of the #COVID19 virus.**

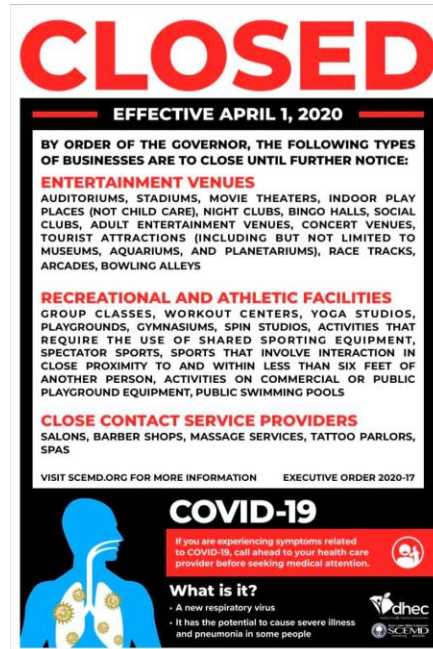

## HEALTH ALERT **CLOSED**

**EFFECTIVE MARCH 27, 2020**

BY ORDER OF THE GOVERNOR, ALL VISITORS TO THE STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA FROM THE STATES OF CONNECTICUT, NEW JERSEY, NEW YORK, THE CITY OF NEW ORLEANS AND ANY OTHER AREA DEEMED TO BE AT HIGH RISK FOR COVID-19 INFECTION MUST IMMEDIATELY ISOLATE OR SELF-QUARANTINE FOR 14 DAYS OR FOR THE DURATION OF THE INDIVIDUAL'S PRESENCE IN SOUTH CAROLINA, WHICHEVER IS SHORTER. FAILURE TO COMPLY COULD RESULT IN A \$100 FINE OR UP TO 30 DAYS IN JAIL. EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 2020-14

**EFFECTIVE MARCH 30, 2020**

BY ORDER OF THE GOVERNOR, ALL PUBLIC PIERS, DOCKS, WHARFS, BOAT RAMPS, AND BOAT LANDINGS PROVIDING PUBLIC ACCESS TO THE PUBLIC WATERS OF THIS STATE, TO INCLUDE ANY ADJACENT OR ASSOCIATED PUBLIC PARKING LOTS OR OTHER PUBLIC FACILITIES, SHALL BE CLOSED TO PUBLIC ACCESS FOR RECREATIONAL PURPOSES FOR THE DURATION OF THE STATE OF EMERGENCY. THE BEACHING OR RAFTING OF BOATS, WHETHER ON A SANDBAR, LAKEHORE, RIVERBANK, OR ISLAND, IS PROHIBITED FOR THE DURATION OF THE STATE OF EMERGENCY. VESSELS MUST REMAIN UNDERWAY AT ALL TIMES UNLESS EXIGENT CIRCUMSTANCES EXIST. ANCHORING TO FISH IS ALLOWED; HOWEVER, RAFTING IS PROHIBITED UNDER ALL CIRCUMSTANCES. THIS ORDER NOT APPLY TO INDIVIDUALS POSSESSING A CURRENT, VALID COMMERCIAL FISHING LICENSE OR PERMIT TO THE EXTENT SUCH INDIVIDUALS MAY SEEK TO UTILIZE OR RELY UPON PUBLIC PIERS, DOCKS, WHARFS, BOAT RAMPS, OR BOAT LANDINGS IN CONNECTION WITH COMMERCIAL FISHING ACTIVITIES.
